Alpine Skiing Athlete Selection Procedures

2026 Winter Olympic Games

Publication Date: May 22, 2025

SECTION 1: OVERVIEW

These procedures outline the pathway for nomination to the Milano-Cortina 2026 Winter Olympic Games in Alpine Skiing.


The maximum Team size can be 22 athletes (11 men, 11 women) with a maximum of 4 athletes per discipline, in each gender, permitted to start each competition. However, final Team size will depend on earned International Ski and Snowboard Federation (FIS) quota. FIS quotas are awarded to the National Olympic Committee (NOC).

SECTION 2: SELECTION PROCESS DIAGRAM

The following provides a high-level overview of how athletes will be nominated to the Team:

FIS Quota Allocation

Athlete quota allocation will be assigned in numerical order of Selection Methods 1-3. The number of quota spots available will be contingent on the number earned by U.S. Ski & Snowboard. Each nation can earn a maximum of four (4) per gender per discipline and 11 per gender across all alpine disciplines.

Note: This diagram is for informational purposes only. In the event of a conflict between the diagram and any written section herein, the written sections will take precedence.

SECTION 3: ATHLETE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Nationality/Passports Requirements:
 - Have a valid United States passport at the time of nomination that does not expire for six months after the conclusion of the 2026 Winter Olympic Games (Games).
- Minimum International Olympic Committee (IOC) Requirements:
 - Abide by the rules in the Olympic Charter, including nationality/citizenship requirements.

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■ For additional information regarding an athlete who is a national of two or more countries, has changed his or her nationality or acquired a new nationality, refer to the Olympic Charter (Rule 41).

- Abide by the IOC Eligibility of Conditions Form/Conditions of Participation Form.
- 3. Organizing Committee of the Olympic Games (OCOG) Requirements:
 - Comply with all rules and policies implemented by the OCOG or Milano-Cortina 2026.
- 4. International Federation Requirements:
 - Comply with all International Ski and Snowboard Federation (FIS) eligibility requirements found here (see Qualification): https://olympics.com/ioc/documents/olympic-games/milano-cortina-2026-olympic-winter-games.
- 5. United States Olympic and Paralympic Committee (USOPC) Requirements:
 - o Comply with all USOPC rules applicable to the Games (e.g., Demonstrations).
 - Complete all USOPC Games Registration requirements by the stated deadline.
 - Comply with the USOPC Delegation Terms, including the Conduct Requirements, which will be made available here: https://www.usopc.org/games-and-qualification
 - Comply with the <u>USOPC Athlete Safety Policy</u> and the <u>U.S. Center for SafeSport Code</u> including education and training requirements.
 - Comply with the current <u>USOPC Background Check Policy</u>
- 6. NGB Requirements:
 - Athlete must possess a valid USA-coded FIS license for the 2025-2026 season.
 - Comply with the NGB Athlete Agreement.
 - Comply with the <u>NGB Code of Conduct</u>
 - Comply with the <u>NGB SafeSport Programs</u>
 - Athlete must have an active NGB membership in good standing.
 - Athlete does not have an active suspension from the U.S. Center for SafeSport that would make the Athlete ineligible to participate in the Games as of January 18th, 2026.
 - Athlete does not have an active sanction for an anti-doping rule/policy violation that would make the Athlete ineligible to participate in the Games as of January 18th, 2026.

SECTION 4: OTHER MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR THE TEAM

- Agree to be bound by and adhere to all IOC, World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA), FIS, United States Anti-Doping Agency (USADA), and USOPC anti-doping protocols, policies and procedures, as applicable. This includes participation in Out-of-Competition Testing and an agreement to be bound to the results management authority of the IOC, WADA, FIS, USADA, or other Anti-Doping Organization as applicable.
- Meet all health and safety protocols, to include vaccine requirements and/or testing requirements set forth by government, local laws, USOPC, FIS, and/or the OCOG.

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SECTION 5: EVALUATIVE EVENTS

Event names, dates, and locations of all trials, competitions, and camps to be used as part of the nomination process are listed below.

- Only individual event results will be considered as part of the evaluative process.
- Please note all dates are based on long range calendars and are subject to change. It is the
 responsibility of each athlete to regularly check the calendars to ensure they are aware of all
 schedule changes.

The following events will be used for evaluation of Selection Method 1-3:

- All individual FIS World Cup and FIS European Cup Alpine competitions held between October 25, 2025 and January 18, 2026.

SECTION 6: SELECTION PROCESS

Step-by-step description of the selection process including an overview of the FIS Qualification System.

6.1 QUALIFICATION FOR EVALUATIVE EVENTS

6.2 FIS QUOTA ALLOCATION AND TEAM NOMINATION

The IOC has determined that a maximum of twenty-two (22) athletes representing any one nation may compete in the 2026 Olympic Winter Games across all events in Alpine Skiing with a maximum of up to eleven (11) male and eleven (11) female athletes. U.S. Ski & Snowboard may enter up to four (4) athletes per gender per event as determined by FIS. Total Olympic Team size will be determined by the FIS using the Olympic Quota Allocation List on January 19th, 2026, and the quota reallocation process on January 21-22, 2026.

Nomination to the Olympic Team does not guarantee the right to start a competition at the Games. Start selections are at the discretion of the U.S. Ski & Snowboard coaching staff, and medical staff where applicable, and will be based on a number of factors including course profiles, technique demands, recent trends in fitness and results, health, tactical skills, and other factors possibly contributing to starting the athletes best prepared for success in a given event.

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Athletes will be nominated to the Olympic Team in the order of:

- 1. World Cup Results in the Evaluative Events (Selection Method 1)
- 2. Discretionary Selection (Selection Method 2)
- 3. World Cup Results or European Cup Results in Evaluative Events (Selection Method 3)

START RIGHTS

Up to four (4) male and up to four (4) female athletes may start for the United States in each discipline (Downhill, Super G, Giant Slalom, and Slalom). In addition, Team USA can enter up to four (4) teams in the Team Combined event.

Athletes qualifying in each discipline under Selection Method 1 listed below will be assured a start in that discipline. Additional starts will be filled at the discretion of the coaching staff based on each athlete's best 2025-2026 season results in the given discipline.

6.2.1 Selection Method 1 - Objective Criteria - World Cup Results

Up to three (3) athletes per gender in each individual discipline will be nominated to the Team based solely upon their individual World Cup results at an Evaluation Event. Athletes meeting the criteria below within a single discipline may be nominated to the Team. Criteria will be applied in order (A through D) until a maximum of three (3) athletes are nominated per discipline per gender:

- A. One or more top three (3) results in a World Cup
- B. One or more top five (5) results in a World Cup
- C. One or more top ten (10) results in a World Cup
- D. One or more top twenty (20) results in a World Cup

Tie-Breaking Mechanisms

Ties within 6.2.1A-D will be broken by nominating the athlete with the next best World Cup result in that discipline. If a tie remains, the process will be repeated as many times as needed to break the tie.

If after the application of 6.2.1A-D total quota per gender is exceeded, up to eleven (11) athletes per gender will be determined by applying objective selection criteria 6.2.1A-D in order across disciplines until the maximum quota allocation within a gender is met.

After Selection Method 1 has been applied, any unfilled quota slots will be filled in sequential order by Selection Methods 2 and 3.

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6.2.2 Selection Method 2 - Discretionary Selection:

Up to twenty-five percent (25%) of total quota spots (across both genders) may be filled based on athlete petitions for discretionary consideration (see Section 7 below) if start right(s) remain within a discipline(s) after applying Selection Method 1.

Athletes must submit a petition to the U.S. Ski & Snowboard Selection Committee during the Selection Period (start of the 2025/26 season through January 18, 2026) for nomination to the Team through discretionary selection. All petitions must be submitted through the online form, which will be made available on the U.S. Ski & Snowboard Website under Alpine Winter Olympic Games Criteria.

After Selection Method 2 has been applied, any unfilled guota slots will be filled by Selection Method 3.

6.2.3 Selection Method 3 (if applicable) - Next Best Result:

If quota spots remain after the application of Selection Methods 1 and 2, any remaining Team nominations will be determined as follows:

6.2.3.1 Considerations of available start rights.

For disciplines where start rights are available, athletes will be nominated in order:

- 1. Athlete with the next best Top 30 World Cup result in that discipline during the Selection Period, not already nominated to the Team.
- 2. Athlete with the single best European Cup result in that discipline during the Selection Period not already nominated to the Team.

6.2.3.2 Remaining allocated quota spots.

If, upon application of Selection Method 6.2.3.1, additional quota spots remain available, athletes who have not otherwise been nominated to the Team will be nominated in the order of the athlete's single best European Cup result during the Selection Period across all disciplines.

U.S. Ski & Snowboard will use the following tie-breaking mechanism if two or more athletes, per gender, are tied with regard to single best result in a specific discipline with available start rights:

- 1. The athlete with the next best result in the same level of competition (World Cup or European Cup as appropriate) will be nominated to the Team.
- 2. If a tie remains, the process will be repeated as many times as needed to break the tie.

Where no available start rights remain, U.S. Ski & Snowboard will nominate the athlete with the next best result at a European Cup. If a tie remains, the process will be repeated as many times as needed to break the tie.

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6.3 Team Combined Event Selection

The Team Combined event consists of one Downhill (DH) skier and one Slalom (SL) skier of the same gender. Selection will be made by coaches' discretion based on the following considerations:

- Slalom athletes for the Team Combined event will be selected based on their best World Cup slalom result in the Evaluative Events.
- Downhill athletes for this event will be selected based on their Downhill race results in the Evaluative Events as well as the 2026 Olympic Downhill race results.

The top DH racer, as chosen above, will be paired with the top SL racer, and so forth through four (4) team assignments.

Athletes competing in the Team Combined event will be selected from the pool of athletes named to the Olympic Team.

In the event of a conflict between this overview and the FIS Qualification System, the FIS Qualification System will take precedence.

SECTION 7: DISCRETIONARY CRITERIA TO NOMINATE ATHLETES FOR THE TEAM

7.1 RATIONALE FOR UTILIZING DISCRETIONARY SELECTION:

Up to twenty-five percent (25%) of total quota slots (across both genders) may be filled using Selection Method 2 for nomination of athletes to the Team via discretionary selection if they have indicated the potential for Olympic success.

There are two scenarios for which U.S. Ski & Snowboard may use discretionary selection criteria:

- Athlete Nomination: Nominating athlete(s) to fill available quotas that are not filled through Selection Method 1 (see Section 6). These athletes must have demonstrated previous Medal Capable results.
- **Team Composition**: Fielding the best alpine athlete(s) with medal capability, future medal capability, and/or nominating athletes who can achieve the best results at the Games.

7.2 DEFINE THE DISCRETIONARY CRITERIA TO BE USED:

The Selection Committee will review data on all athletes when evaluating petitions for consideration and will consider the following criteria in no particular order when making discretionary nomination decisions:

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- Medal Capable Athlete: A medal capable athlete is an athlete who has had a Top 30 World Cup/World Championship result or a Top 3 European Cup result in the Evaluative Events.
- Athletes meeting Objective Criteria Selection Method 1: Any athlete who achieved the World Cup Top 20 results required for Selection Method 1, but was not nominated due to quota limits (see Section 6.2.1).
- Injury, illness, or circumstances that prevent participation in the Evaluative Events.

7.3 SELECTION COMMITTEE

The committee that will be responsible for making discretionary selections or other decisions and recommendations directly impacting athletes in the selection process.

Committee Name: U.S. Ski & Snowboard Selection Committee

- U.S. Ski & Snowboard Chief of Sport
- U.S. Alpine Ski Team Head Men's Coach
- U.S. Alpine Ski Team Head Women's Coach
- U.S. Ski & Snowboard Alpine Sport Committee Chair
- 10 Year Alpine Athlete Representative (non-competing) selected by the Athlete's Council
- Alpine Athlete Representative (non-competing) selected by the Athlete's Council

SECTION 8: MANDATORY TRAINING AND/OR COMPETITION

Specify the location, schedule, and duration of all mandatory training and/or competition for athletes who are nominated to the Team.

Athletes may be required to attend a mandatory training camp(s) and/or competition(s) to be held at a venue to be announced. Any mandatory training camp(s) and/or competitions after the date of nomination will be announced at least thirty (30) days prior to the start of training or competition. Location, schedule, and duration of any mandatory training and/or competition will be posted on U.S. Ski & Snowboard's website at www.usskiandsnowboard.org/

Waivers from a mandatory training camp(s) and/or competition(s) will not be unreasonably withheld. Requests for a waiver must be submitted in writing to the respective U.S. Ski & Snowboard Alpine Head Coach as far in advance as possible. Refer to Section 17 for contact details.

SECTION 9: DATE OF TEAM NOMINATION

- U.S. Ski & Snowboard will nominate the Team, including any replacements/alternates to the USOPC on or before January 20, 2026.
- If U.S. Ski & Snowboard receives any additional quota through FIS reallocation, those athletes will be nominated to the USOPC on January 23, 2026.

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SECTION 10: REMOVAL OF ATHLETES FROM THE TEAM 10.1 NGB JURISDICTION

U.S. Ski & Snowboard has jurisdiction over athlete nominees until athlete entries have been submitted by the USOPC to the Organizing Committee of the Olympic Games (OCOG).

- a. An athlete who is nominated to the Team by U.S. Ski & Snowboard may be removed for any of the following reasons, as determined by U.S. Ski & Snowboard:
 - i. <u>Voluntary withdrawal</u>. Athlete submits a written letter to the U.S. Ski & Snowboard CEO or Chief of Sport requesting to voluntarily withdraw from the Team.
 - ii. <u>Injury or illness</u>. A physician (or medical staff) approved by U.S. Ski & Snowboard provides certification that the Athlete has a debilitating condition. If Athlete refuses to provide verification of their illness or injury by a physician (or medical staff), their injury will be assumed to be debilitating, and they may be removed from the Team.
 - iii. <u>Failure to participate</u>. Athlete does not participate in all Mandatory Training and/or Competition as defined in these procedures.
 - iv. Code of Conduct Violation. Athlete violates the U.S. Ski & Snowboard Code of Conduct
 - v. <u>Athlete Agreement</u>. Athlete violates a term in their signed U.S. Ski & Snowboard Athlete Agreement.
 - vi. <u>Non-compliance.</u> Athlete does not meet the athlete eligibility requirements listed in Section 3 and Section 4 of these selection procedures.
- b. An Athlete may be removed as a nominee to the Team or from the Team if found to have violated IOC, WADA, FIS, USADA, and/or USOPC anti-doping protocol, policies and procedures, the U.S. Center for SafeSport Code, the USOPC Athlete Safety Policy, and NGB SafeSport policies, as applicable.

10.2 USOPC JURISDICTION

- a. Once Athlete entries have been submitted by the USOPC to the Organizing Committee of the Olympic Games, the USOPC has jurisdiction over the Team.
- b. USOPC's Delegation Conduct Requirements apply in addition to the NGB Code of Conduct. The Delegation Conduct Requirements in the USOPC Games Delegation Terms are specific to each Games and are made available during the Games registration process.
- c. The USOPC's Grievance Procedures and Hearing Process are found within the USOPC Dispute Resolution Policy and Hearing Procedures.

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SECTION 11: SELECTION PROCESS IF ATHLETE VACANCY OCCURS PRIOR TO SUBMISSION OF ENTRIES BY NAME TO THE ORGANIZING COMMITTEE OF THE OLYMPIC GAMES

- 11.1 Should a vacancy occur prior to submission of Entries by Name by the USOPC to the Organizing Committee of the Olympic Games, the athlete will be replaced by the U.S. Ski & Snowboard Selection Committee using the selection process as specified in Section 6 to fill the specific gender and discipline quota vacancy. Any replacement of athletes must comply with these selection procedures, IOC, USOPC, and FIS regulations, and entry deadlines.
- 11.2 All replacement athletes must meet all requirements listed in Sections 3-4.

SECTION 12: SELECTION PROCESS IF ATHLETE VACANCY OCCURS AFTER SUBMISSION OF ENTRIES BY NAME TO THE ORGANIZING COMMITTEE OF THE OLYMPIC GAMES

- 12.1 Should a vacancy occur after submission of Entries by Name by the USOPC to the Organizing Committee of the Olympic Games, if allowed, the same process will be followed as specified in Section 11.
- 12.2 All replacement athletes must meet all requirements listed in Sections 3-4.

SECTION 13: RIGHT TO A HEARING

An athlete who is removed from the Team has the right to a hearing per the <u>U.S. Ski and Snowboard's grievance procedures</u> (Article IX, Section B) and the USOPC Bylaws, Section 9 (https://www.usopc.org/governance/dispute-resolution).

SECTION 14: REQUIRED DOCUMENTS

In addition to the USOPC Delegation Conduct Requirements, the following documents are required to be signed by an athlete as a condition of nomination to the Olympic Games.

U.S. Ski & Snowboard Code of Conduct

SECTION 15: DISCLAIMERS

These procedures are based on IOC and FIS rules and regulations as presently known and understood. Any change in the selection procedures caused by a change in IOC and/or FIS rules and regulations will be distributed to the affected athletes immediately. The selection criteria are based on the latest information available to NGB.

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However, the selection criteria are always subject to unforeseen, intervening circumstances, and realistically may not have accounted for every possible contingency. If any force of nature, pandemic, or force majeure, should cause the alteration or cancellation of any of the selection events listed in this document, these selection procedures may require revisions, pursuant to their resubmission to the USOPC.

SECTION 16: CONFLICT OF INTEREST

All members of the Selection Committee (Section 7.3) and all individuals who developed these selection procedures (Section 21) must comply with the U.S. Ski & Snowboard Conflict of Interest Policy, to include completing and submitting a disclosure form consistent with the U.S. Ski & Snowboard Conflict of Interest Policy before convening the committee.

Any person with a good faith belief that a committee member has a conflict of interest may report the alleged conflict of interest to the NGB Ethics Committee. Reports may also be made anonymously through the USOPC's Integrity Portal. No committee member shall retaliate in any way against a person who, in good faith, reports an alleged conflict of interest. In addition, the USOPC maintains a strict no retaliation policy that prohibits any employee, contractor, agent, volunteer, or member of the USOPC to take or threaten to take any action against an athlete for reporting information to or seeking assistance from the Office of the Athlete Ombuds.

Any recused individual shall be replaced in accordance with the NGB Selection Committee appointment process.

SECTION 18: GRIEVANCES

The U.S. Ski & Snowboard Grievance Procedures can be found in Article IX, Section B of the <u>U.S. Ski & Snowboard Bylaws</u>.

Section 9 of the USOPC Bylaws provides a process for an athlete to file a complaint with the USOPC against an NGB alleging that he or she has been denied, or threatened to be denied, with the opportunity to participate in a Protected Competition, as defined in the USOPC bylaws. SECTION 19: NON-RETALIATION

The USOPC and NGB have zero tolerance for retaliation against people who make good faith reports of potential ethical, policy, or legal violations or who cooperate with investigations of those reports. That means no USOPC or NGB staff, Board or Committee member, or volunteer may threaten, harass, discriminate against, or take any negative employment or related action (e.g., discharge, demotion, suspension, negative review) on that basis.

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APPENDIX B – GLOSSARY

Contingency means a future event or circumstance which is possible but cannot be predicted with certainty.

Delegation Event means the Olympic Games, the Olympic Winter Games, the Paralympic Games, the Paralympic Winter Games, the Pan American Games, and the Parapan American Games.

Force Majeure means an event or effect that cannot be reasonably anticipated or controlled (e.g., hurricane, tornado, etc.).

Grievance Procedures means the process that enables an athlete to file a complaint with the NGB or USOPC.

Jurisdiction means the power or authority to make decisions and judgments.

Nominated means an athlete, coach or staff member whose name has been submitted to the USOPC by an NGB for participation in a Delegation Event.

Protected Competition means a Delegation Event or a Qualifying Competition.

Qualifying Competition means either of the following:

- i. NGB Qualifying Competition: Any competition or activity organized or approved by the NGB where the athlete's performance or results are considered in the published selection criteria to represent the United States in a Delegation Event.
- ii. International Qualifying Competition: Any international sport competition where (i) athletes represent the United States against athletes representing other nations, (ii) the NGB officially designates entrants, as required by the competition organizers, and (iii) athlete results or performance are included in the published criteria to qualify, or be selected, to represent the United States in a Delegation Event.

Selected means an athlete, coach or staff member whose name has been submitted by the USOPC to the OCOG at the final submission date, as determined by the OCOG.
